Interim TV Recycling Program Frequently Asked Questions

Why are the televisions being recycled?

Between 2010 and the end of 2013, analog TV broadcasts will be progressively switched off around Australia. On 5 May 2011, many parts of regional and rural Victoria switched from analog to digital transmission resulting in large numbers of households electing to purchase new television to watch free-to-air broadcasts. As a result, high volumes of old televisions are being disposed of.

A national recycling program is planned but the implementation date is yet to be decided. In the meantime, the Australian and Victorian governments have provided funding to implement a free, interim service to collect and recycle TVs.

When and where are the collections being held in regional Victoria?

The interim TV recycling program will operate for one month in selected regional and rural areas in Victoria. The program will commence on Thursday 30 June 2011 and continue until close of business on Sunday 31 July 2011. Check drop off locations and operating hours below.

Can anyone use the television recycling service?

This service is available to residents of Victoria and New South Wales.

What types of televisions can be dropped off for recycling?

All types of TVs (including digital) can be recycled. Analog video cassette recorders will not be accepted.

What is the cost for this service?

The service is free of charge to the public for the period of the service. After 31 July, normal council arrangements will resume until the national scheme is put in place.

Can I dispose of my e-waste with my TV?

No. Other electrical and electronic wast (e-waste) will not be accepted for recycling through this program. Only televisions will be accepted.

Check with your local council to see what collection programs are in place for e-waste disposal or refer to Byteback for computer recycling locations.

What happens to my TV once I drop it off?

Recyclers will collect the television and transport it to their recycling facilities. The TVs will then be broken down into different materials including glass, lead, plastics and valuable metals and processed into new materials.

What happens after the Interim TV recycling program has finished?

The Australian Government, in partnership with State Governments, is developing a national product stewardship regulation that will lead to long term and ongoing services for the community to recycle their old televisions and computer equipment. The date for this service is yet to be decided.
